### The United Way Family | 2015 / 2016

For the next **5** years we are investing in **30** agencies; **18** of which are funded for the Long Term, **4** are funded for Innovation and the remaining **8** agencies are committed to staying connected to UWP to work with us in collaboration in moving people from poverty to possibility and building strong healthy communities.

#### United Way's Long-Term Priority Funding

Long-Term Priority Funding is used to stabilize agencies that align to the community priorities and outcomes identified by United Way. Agencies receive funding for up to 5 years and are expected to meet the highest standards in organizational accountability. **United Way is thrilled to announce \$1,086,000 in Long Term Priority Funding** will be directed to the following 18 agencies on an annual basis beginning in 2015.

#### United Way's Innovation Funding

Through our new Innovation Fund, United Way supports non-profit innovators, whether small or large, to design and/or deliver new initiatives that meet identified emerging social issues. Innovation Funding is one-time funding provided for up to 2 years to an individual charitable organization for their own initiative or to serve as the lead on a multi-agency initiative. **United Way is thrilled to introduce \$170,800 in new Innovation Funding** to be directed to the following 4 projects beginning in 2015.

#### United Way's Neighbourhood Funding

United Way wants to make neighbourhoods safe and strong across our community. Neighbourhoods thrive when there is strong resident engagement and local leadership to achieve positive change. In 2016, United Way will be launching our Neighbourhood Fund to support grassroots neighbourhood and resident initiatives.

#### **United Way's Partner Agencies**

United Way will focus efforts and investment on targeted priority goals moving beyond the traditional role of funder to include agencies wishing to be part of the United Way family as a non-funded partner. These efforts include using the voice of United Way as an advocate to optimize our relationships with gov't and local social change agents to help shape social policy creating positive and sustained impact on the lives of those living in the City and County of Peterborough.

#### 2015 United Way Youth Grants

United Way Peterborough & District's (UWP) commitment to this community's youth continues. On March 23, United Way Board of Directors approved the distribution of \$1,650 through the 2015 Youth Grant Program. Thanks to donors and community partners, for the past 10 years UWP has provided funding up to \$500 (to a maximum of \$2,000 annually) for youth led projects in the community. The total dollars distributed through Youth Grants in that time is more than \$15,000.

### Other United Way Community Programs

#### **BackPacks for Kids**

United Way Peterborough & District's Backpacks for Kids program works to address issues of poverty by providing backpacks to children and youth in our community who wouldn't normally be able to afford new school supplies. Each new backpack contains common items required for school and is customized for each grade level. Our program strives to ensure that all students in need are ready for school and over the last 10 years we have distributed over 8,489 backpacks.

#### Coats 4 Kids & Grown Ups Too

United Way Peterborough & District's Coats for Kids and Grown-Ups Too program strives to keep children and their families warm during the cold winter months by providing clean, gently-used winter wear to children, youth, and adults in Peterborough City and County. Since the program's inception over twenty-nine years ago, thousands of coats have been distributed throughout our community. In the last ten years alone the Coats for Kids Program has distributed more than 15,000 pieces of winter wear.

Since 1986, individuals and families have donated gently used winter wear which is then cleaned at no cost to the program by local dry cleaning providers. Kent Cleaners, Rocky's Cleaners, Ferguson Cleaners, Grainger's Cleaners, and Windsor's Dry Cleaning Centre have been active and committed program partners since the program began 29 years ago.

Other community partners such as Global Point Logistics, TST Overland Express, and Winslow Gerolamy Motors Ltd. have ensured that cleaned coats can be stored and then transported to distribution locations throughout the City and County of Peterborough. **Donated items are collected in the Spring for distribution in the Fall.** 

## UWP is proud to be the Community Entity for the Federally Funded Homelessness Partnering Strategy (HPS)

For over 7 years, UWP has been overseeing the distribution and use of HPS funds in Peterborough, accountable to both a volunteer Community Advisory Board, comprised of seasoned local leaders working in housing and homelessness, and the Federal government. From April 1, 2015 to March 31, 2017, \$263,000 will be provided to support the work of the Homelessness Coordinated Response Team (HCRT). HCRT provides a collaborative community response to individuals and families experiencing homelessness with the goal of securing access to permanent, affordable and safe housing.

#### **United Way Training & Learning Centre**

Building knowledge - Strengthening capacity - Creating possibility

In 2014, we continued our commitment to support the development of strong and effective charitable sector organizations. By offering an extensive menu of professional development opportunities such as organizational management training, mediation, and strategic planning. We build the skills needed to be an effective and responsible leader.

#### **Ensuring Access to Information for All Residents**

Community Information Services is a United Way partnership with the City and County of Peterborough to deliver timely and relevant information and referral services to local residents and organization to promote community volunteerism. To deliver this service we maintain the Peterborough County portion of **www.fourinfo.com**, the most extensive and widely searched online database of community information and volunteer opportunities for Peterborough City and County.

## **Labour Community Services**

2014 saw our labour partnership continue with increased work around the Peterborough Workers' Action Centre. This entity has many community partners including United Way Peterborough & District and the Peterborough and District Labour Council. In 2014 the Workers' Action Centre completed Terms of Reference for its four committees and will be presenting educational opportunities for workers in precarious employment in 2015.

Labour Community Services has also been following and participating in the Poverty and Employment Precarity in Southern Ontario workgroup led by McMaster University and United Way Greater Toronto. This workgroup has produced two leading reports on the prevalence of precarious employment, "It's More than Poverty" and the "Precarity Penalty". We continue to participate in this research and applying the findings to the employment situation in Peterborough and area.

2015 will see the first significant consultations on labour law reform in over two decades. Labour Community Services will be making submissions to the Changing Workplace Review panel that will be travelling the province seeking input from all shareholders. The very nature of work and employer/employee relationships has changed considerably in the past few years. We will be presenting recommendations to take these changes into consideration and how best address the changing needs of working people in our community.

## Treasurer's Report | 2014

The United Way Peterborough and District has changed its fiscal year end from December 31st to March 31st. The financial statements included in this Annual Report include both fiscal periods.

The 15 months ended March 31, 2015 has been another challenging period from a financial perspective for the United Way of Peterborough and District. As the new member agency funding model was about to be implemented in January 2015, the Board of Directors felt that it was important to stabilize member agency funding at the prior year level for 2014 and to provide transitional funding for the 2015 stub period. In order to do so the Board of Directors approved budget deficits for 2014 and the 2015 stub period.

Total revenue for 2014 was \$2.4 million which was a decrease of about \$180,000 from 2013. The largest portion of revenue was from campaign which totaled just over \$2 million, representing a decrease of 7% from the previous year. Other revenues totaled almost \$375,000, which was a decrease of \$15,000 compared to 2013, and consisted of investment, program, grant and Nevada income and other donations. All of these revenues, with the exception of Nevada income, decreased slightly from the prior year.

Total expenditures for 2014 were just over \$3 million. Contributions allocated to member agencies amounted to \$1.85 million which was slightly higher than the prior year. Designations totaled \$99,000, a decrease of \$10,000 from 2013. Program expenses, including organization and community development, labour and homelessness, totaled almost \$506,000, which was an increase of 19.7% from 2013. Community investment (general management and administration) and campaign expenditures totaled \$505,000, which was an increase of 5.2% from 2013. There was an overall deficit of \$569,000 for 2014.

Total revenue for the 2015 stub period was \$392,000, reflecting the slower time of year for the organization. Campaign revenue made up 81% of the total with the next largest contributors to revenue being grants at 10% and investment income at 7%. Expenditures for this period totaled \$595,000. As a result, there was a deficit of \$203,000.

Mainly due to the operating deficits for the 2014 year and the 2015 stub period, the cash and investments balance decreased by approximately \$660,000 over the 15 month period. Pledges receivable decreased considerably over the same period as a result of the decreased campaign revenues and the change in the fiscal year end and interest and other receivables and prepaid expenses balances also changed mainly due to the change in the fiscal year end. The liabilities were fairly consistent from the prior year, amounting to \$209,000 as at March 31st, the largest of which was accounts payable and accrued liabilities. The organization ended the stub period with an operating fund balance of \$530,717 and an endowment fund balance of \$1,559,847. The total fund balances amounted to \$2.09 million of which \$1.67 million was subject to external donor restrictions.

I would like to thank the Finance Committee for their contributions of time and expertise and the staff for their diligent, accurate and thoughtful work throughout the year.

The Statement of Financial Position and Statement of Operations presented here have been extracted from the audited financial statements for the fiscal periods ended December 31, 2014 and March 31, 2015 which were audited by BDO Canada LLP. The audited financial statements were reviewed by our Finance Committee and approved by our Board of Directors.
